MESSAGE FROM THE METROPOLITAN POLICE

It appears some drivers are not adhering to road safety rules and therefore putting other road users as well as member of the public safety at risk. This email is to remind all of us that together anyone can report a vehicle if it is violating any parking restrictions. A vehicle is parked illegally if it is:

double parked (more than 50cm from the kerb)

in a bus stop or bus lane

in a disabled parking space without a Blue Badge

in a pay and display parking space without displaying a valid parking ticket (except bank holidays)

in a residents or business parking space without a valid permit

on school entrance markings

on the pavement or verge (except in a legal pavement parking space)

on waiting restriction lines (yellow lines)

parked on or next to a dropped kerb


parked overnight (heavy goods vehicles over 5 tonnes)

If you do not follow parking restrictions, you may receive a **Penalty Charge Notice** and your vehicle may be removed.

You can report any parking violations by contacting Parking Services on 020 8379 6406, Monday to Friday from 9am to 3pm. Or call 020 3856 0036 outside of these hours.



SAPPHIRE CLASS

I am really impressed with how independent the children are becoming when working in their groups. This is absolutely fantastic and please do keep this up! Thank you to those of you who returned their reading records today. Please can I really stress the real importance of high-quality, daily phonic/reading times at home (for at least 20 minutes) as reading is our real focus in school and must be further supported at home. Please also may I remind **Year 2 children** about beginning to write comments themselves in their reading record. This should be supported by a grown up given the fact this is new to the children but please do be really specific in the comments that are made. Below are some specific suggested that can be recorded:

How fluently has the book been read (90 words or so in a minute is the fluency expectation in KS1)? How well have the book been comprehended where the children have found the answers to questions in the text?

What did you discuss? What did you find interesting?

Did you have to find out what some words mean? If so, what words were these?

What did you find tricky? How did you overcome the challenge?

Please do stress the importance to your child about appropriate times to be going to the toilet. We have had many occasions this week where some children have had their break and lunchtimes and then have asked to go to the toilet as soon as we have returned into the classroom. It is absolutely vital that the children go to the toilet at break and lunchtime so when we do return to the classroom, we are ready to go straight into our learning. Please can we also make sure that all uniform is labelled as we have a few jumpers in the classroom that are not named and therefore cannot be returned. Have a lovely, safe weekend, and hopefully the sun will remain shining!

DIAMOND CLASS

This week the Diamond children have been producing some great written work based on images of ships. We have spent a good deal of time up-leveling our own work and trying to be as descriptive as possible while making our writing atmospheric. In maths, Diamond Class have been dealing with division as well as multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000. Well done for your hard maths work and remember to use Timestables Rockstar to help keep your times-tables skills fresh. The children have also been learning all about the water cycle and the various states of matter that water exists in different circumstances. The pupils engaged in a water cycle dance and an experiment to demonstrate the different states of water. In geography the children really enjoyed a quiz about climate and the different zones that exist on planet earth. In Diamond's religious studies they have been looking at the story of Peter and his denial of Jesus, which has given the children lots to think about on the subject's morality.

EMERALD CLASS

This week the children of Emerald class have been continuing to practise their English skills with some creative and descriptive writing about Vikings. They have dealt with choosing appropriate synonyms as well as looking at what makes effective similes and metaphors. They have also spent a good portion of the week picking apart and up-leveling a piece of their own work to fine tune their writing ability. In their history lessons they have looked at Saxon town names across the UK and finished off some map work and their designs for their Viking shields. We have also had a discussion about the Black Lives Matter movement and will be continuing to look into this in further detail in the future. In maths we have been focusing on statistics. The children have created a number of line graphs throughout the week and answered questions based around them. In science this morning we have been looking at materials that are good insulators and conductors, by making an electrical circuit with a gap in and seeing which objects allow electricity to pass through. Well done Emerald and have a great weekend.


Bridging the Gap

We are thrilled to announce that in the past few months three weddings have taken place of the BOHCM staff. In Uganda, weddings are traditionally a family and community affair with hundreds of people attending the event. Currently due to the pandemic, numbers at weddings are to be kept very small but can still take place in church followed by a simple celebration. We were delighted to receive photos of the three couples and wish them all the best for a strong and happy marriage.



Clean Water Saves Lives

We give thanks to God that yet again BOHCM has been able to arrange the construction of another Protected Spring, thus ensuring that up to two hundred people per day can now receive clean water.

Child sponsorship

Across the district of Rukungiri, schools are preparing to open in regulated phases. Children in Primary 4 & 5 will return to school on the 4th April, P6 children are already studying at school as are P7 candidates who are preparing to take their exams at the end of March. All other children will hopefully return to their school on the 4th June. Although it is said that Primary education is free in Government run schools, parents are still required to provide a termly parental contribution, scholastic materials including exercise books, plus the school uniform and sweater for each child. Sponsorship is a true blessing to a family and helps to lift the burden from a child's guardian by enabling the sponsored child to receive a regular education.

Currently our Primary 7 candidates and teachers are working hard and putting in extra hours of study to prepare for the exams scheduled for the end of March. Our P6 children are also facing the challenge of trying to catch up with so many hours of lost study during the Lockdown. They are required to reach a certain standard in order to progress to P7 in due course. These children are pleased to be back at school and benefit further from a daily free school lunch. We are looking forward to hearing more about the phased return to school for the other children.



Vocational Training

Students have now been allowed to commence or return to their training placements.
Currently we are supporting twelve young people to learn practical skills such as carpentry, tailoring, hairdressing and craft making, whilst a further two students are training as primary or nursery teachers.

Bridge of Hope Children's Village

Our access road from the main highway to the BOHCM CV has become so worn with the rains that it has become a



danger to our staff and anyone visiting there in a vehicle. Our manager Ben in Uganda is in the process of arranging for repairs to the road and we hope this work can commence very soon. We have also made improvements to the solar lighting in the two homes to ensure that safe lighting is available whenever needed. Paraffin lamps and candles are a common but risky source of lighting in Uganda and our maintenance of the solar lighting prevents the use of such items. Two of the children have spent several days in hospital since our last newsletter to monitor unexplained high temperatures but we thank God that they recovered and are now safely home.

Building Projects 2021 – So far this year BOHCM has provided two more families with a latrine and together with the local community assisted an



elderly woman to construct a kitchen.

Vaccination – Uganda has to date received 964,000 doses of Covid I9 vaccine; the latest donation was given by the Indian Government and consisted of I00,000 doses. Health care workers and teachers are expected to be the first to receive the vaccination followed by the elderly population.


